### **1 Focus on External Events**

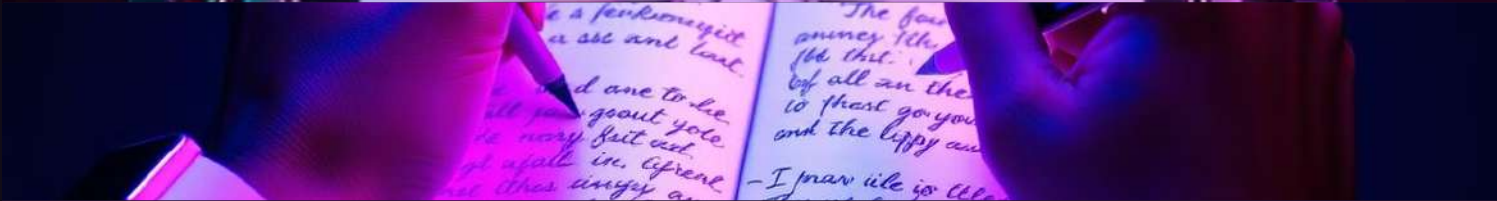
Objective poetry describes the world around the poet, focusing on actions, events, and observations.
