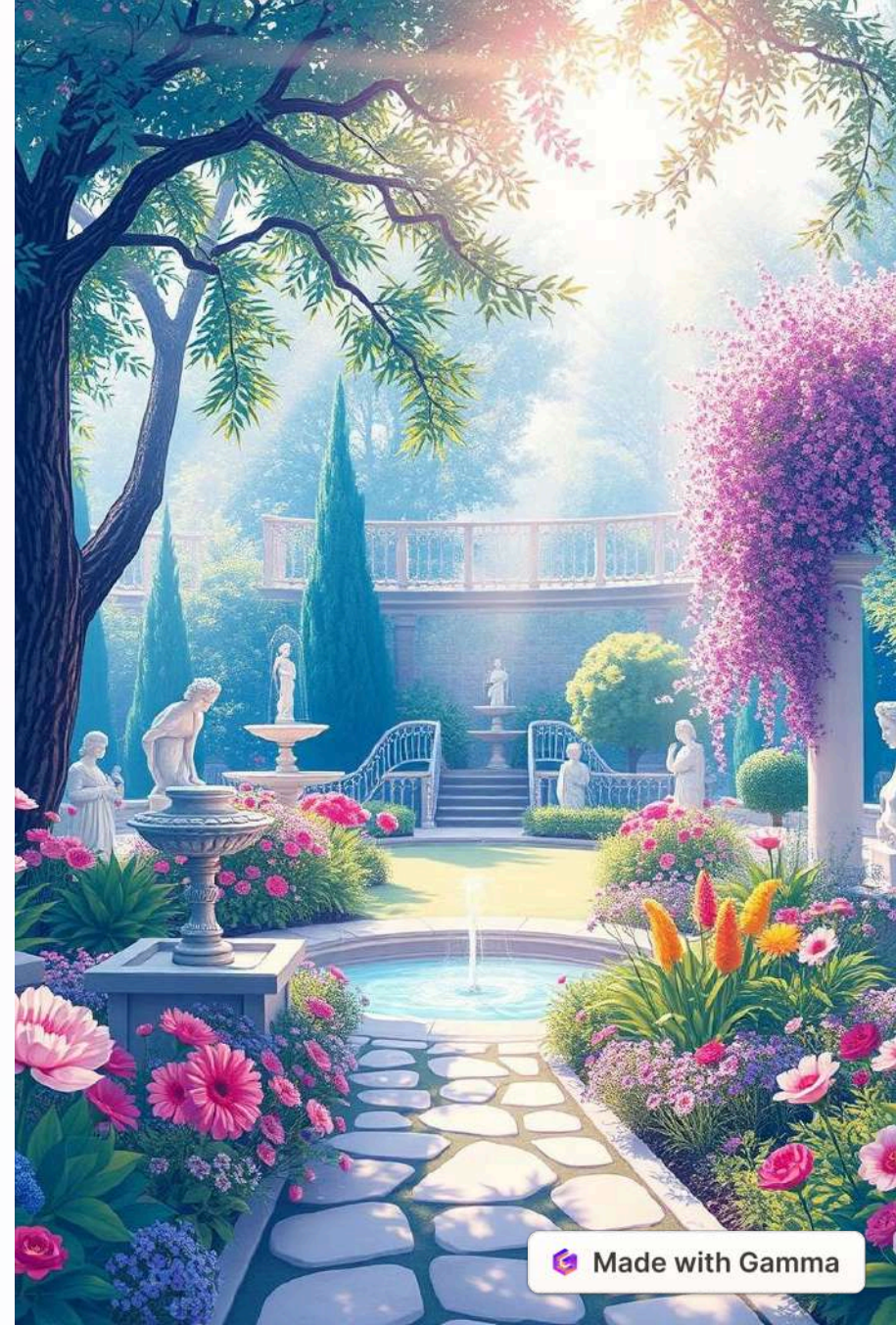

Origins and History of the Sonnet

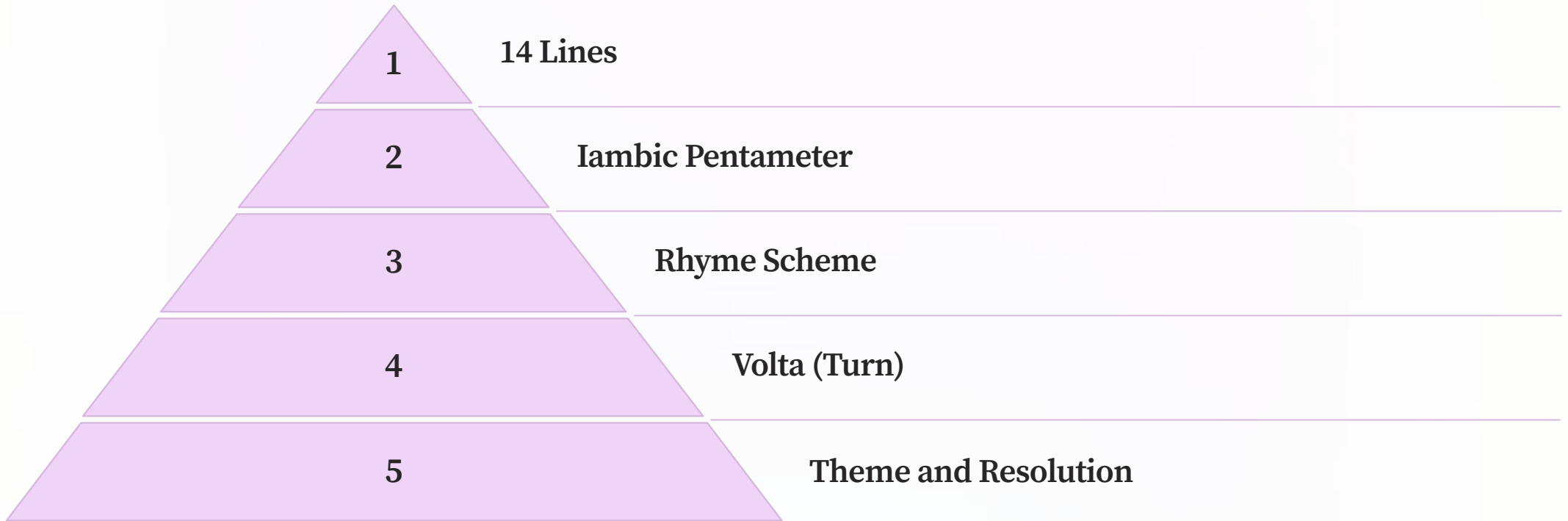
Ancient Origins

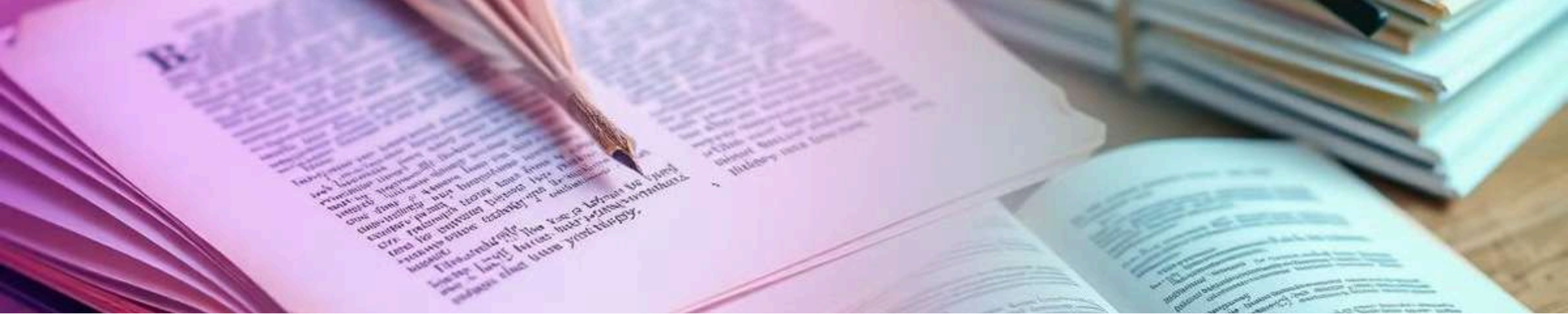
The sonnet, with its roots in ancient Greek poetry, was developed by Italian poets in the 13th century.

Exploring the Shakespearean Sonnet

1

Structure

The Shakespearean sonnet consists of three quatrains followed by a final couplet.

2

Rhyme Scheme

It follows the ABAB CDCD EFEF GG rhyme scheme, with a final couplet resolving the poem's central theme.

Themes

Shakespearean sonnets explore a wide range of emotions, including love, beauty, time, mortality, and the human condition.

The Petrarchan Sonnet and its Innovations

1

Octave

The Petrarchan sonnet is divided into an octave (eight lines) and a sestet (six lines).

2

Volta (Turn)

The volta, a shift in tone or perspective, typically occurs between the octave and the sestet.

3

Rhyme Scheme

The octave follows the ABBAABBA rhyme scheme, while the sestet can vary, often using CDECDE or CDCDCD.
